Independent Writing Project K-2 Mini-Lesson Summaries Sheet

#### Session 6:

- Step I: YouTube Link: https://youtu.be/5N9tu8UAMLE
- Step 2 Independent writers can use their illustrations to help them elaborate in their words on the page.
- Step 3: Writer's Work: Look at the details in your picture on each page and see if the details in the picture are written in words too. If not, add those words in.

#### Session 7:

- Step I: YouTube Link: https://youtu.be/aNVHQlt09Hg
- Step 2: Independent writers revise to make their writing stronger. They might take out parts, add new parts in, or rearrange things so that the writing piece makes sense to their reader. They can use a flap, a post-it, or a whole new page to make these revisions.
- Step 3: Writer's Work: Read your piece over as a whole and think, "Do all of the parts go together? Does it make sense? Can I take something out because it is confusing or doesn't fit? Do I need to add something to make it flow better or make it clearer for my reader?" Use a different color writing tool so we can see your revision. Go for big revisions!

#### Session 8:

- Step 2: Independent writers edit so that it is easy for their readers to read it the way the author intended. They can edit for:
  - o Capital letters and punctuation
  - o Spelling
  - o If narrative, use of quotation marks and dialogue tags
- Step 3: Writer's Work: Use the editing checklist (attached) and edit your piece for one thing at a time. Read it though only editing for punctuation that is needed. Read it again and look only at spelling-does it look right? Continue until it is just the way you want it to be!

#### Session 9:

- Step 2: Independent writers fancy up their writing for publishing. They can:
  - o Add more detail and color in the illustrations
  - o Make an "About the Author" page
  - Make a title and front cover for the book
  - Make a back of the book blurb
  - o Make a dedication page

- Make a video of yourself responding to the following questions:
  - o Find a place where you tried something from your mentor text in your own writing. Why did you choose that to try?
  - o Name your most interesting technique and explain why it works so well.
  - What easy and challenging for you as a writer in this independent writing project? What do you want to work on next?
